COURAGE AT CAMP—CONFIRMATION/ELEMENTARY CAMP

From Sunday, June 26th - Friday, July 1st, Bob, Brenda Crook, and I were at Stony Lake Lutheran Camp with 14 middle and elementary youth. Some of these youth returned to camp from last year, but most were first-time campers. It can be a little bit of a shock for many who don't camp much, and who don't disengage from technology on a regular basis.

Our week included Bible studies about the courage to trust, forgive, stand up for others, do justice, and connect with others. We worked with several other church groups and so we had the opportunity to share teaching responsibilities, and the youth heard voices they don't listen to every day.

The confirmation youth also participated in an event called "Low Ropes," which is a challenge course that encourages and challenges how a group works together. It begins with trust, but also includes communication, listening, trying new things, and the ability to make the goal of the group the priority. Our groups seem to struggle with this communication and trying new things part. They experienced others talking over each other and not listening, but surprise, the last two days were awesome. The group achieved their goals and now know how it feels as a group to succeed.

There was also swimming, lots of games, devotions, chores, food, laughter, tears, fun, and frustration.

Camp can be a life-changing event for our youth, so thank you to this congregation who has committed to pay one half of the tuition for our first-time confirmation youth who attend. As our numbers increase, this amount grows and grows. Everyone who gives to the general fund in their offering has assisted in the ministry to these youth.

I look forward to next year. Some of the middle school youth are wanting to return as high school campers. You want to see a happy pastor—it is this one at camp!

We will have a "Noisy Offering" in August for Living Water Ministries.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Members in Christ,

Hope you are enjoying the wonders that only our Lord can create during these summer months. Metaphors aside, **WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?**

- *We have a Council and Board structure that is cumbersome; puts a lot of reliance on a few persons. Four person board, with one Council representative. Someone gets to go to two meetings per month. (Think: ROCK, PAPER, and SCISSORS!)

- *We have term limits. If one is called to serve or gifted in say Christian Education, they are term limited. (So sorry, you cannot serve beyond your term.)

- *We have elected boards of (4), except the Trustees. What if more want to serve? (Oh, you can, but you are not official; you are not "on the board".)

- *We have boards that have out lived their usefulness. Church Life for example has been struggling to find activities that people say they are interested in, and WILL ATTEND. I have therefore, told this group not to meet, to "meet", just for the sake of meeting.

- *We are essentially a "non-profit board", yet we use antiquated terms to describe our structure. In the non-profit world, there is one "BOARD or COUNCIL" legally bound. All the other working groups are considered: Teams, Task Forces, or Committees.

- *People want to serve, but don't want to be committed to a 2 or 1 year "board" commitment.

We the Council are working on structural changes to the organization to maximize change and forward thinking/planning. We will bring Constitutional changes to the next Congregational Meeting in December.

NOISY OFFERING—LIVING WATER MINISTRIES

On Sunday, August 21st, and Wednesday, August 24th, we will receive a Noisy Offering for Living Water Ministries (LWM). In June, 17 Ascension youth attended confirmation camp and elementary camp at Stony Lake. It was a week of challenge and hopefully sowing seeds of a deeper faith. LWM also hosts other camps, as well as the Michigan Gathering and the new Middle School Gathering “Charge.”

Living Water’s mission is “Bringing together all of God’s children to experience Christian community, grow in faith, develop leadership skills, and serve others.” In addition to youth ministry, LWM hosts a week called “Abundant Life” where developmentally challenged adults spend a week experiencing camp. There is a week of camp specifically for foster children, campers who are experiencing homelessness, and camps that develop leaders, including a new camp experience this summer called Multi-Cultural Youth Leadership Academy that is funded in part by an ELCA grant and is bringing youth from Michigan and other states around the country together to learn and experience leadership in our multicultural world.

Camp can be life changing, the experience is life changing. So, when we take up this offering, I encourage you to dig deep into your heart and pockets, because LWM also does not want to turn away any children because of financial hardship. Thanks be to God!!!

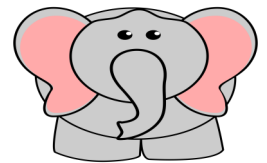
TAKING STEPS AGAINST HUNGER—SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 25TH

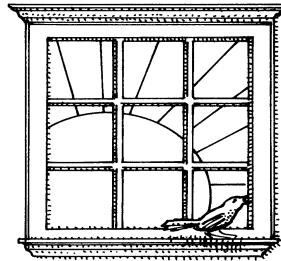

PANIC DISORDER

Panic disorder is an anxiety disorder suffered by 2-3% of American adults, with women suffering this disorder twice as commonly as men. It can be a very disabling disorder; sufferers of extreme cases of panic disorder may even be afraid to leave their homes.

A panic attack is a discrete episode of anxiety in which one experiences a number of physical symptoms, which may include racing heart, shortness of breath or hyperventilation, chest pain or tightness, hot flashes or chills, sweating and shaking. Some people report feeling faint or as if they may be having a heart attack. These episodes typically last about fifteen to twenty minutes. Afterward, the person usually feels drained and lethargic for the rest of the day.

Panic disorder features the occurrence of repeated *unexpected* panic attacks, typically multiple attacks in a week. Some people may suffer more than one panic attack per day. Panic attacks may also occur in response to environmental cues, generally due to being in situations in which one has felt anxious or had a panic attack before.

Agoraphobia frequently occurs with panic disorder. Agoraphobia is a fear of going to or being in places from which escape is difficult or impossible. Such situations may include crowded areas such as the mall, retail stores of any kind, or stadiums or theaters. Those suffering agoraphobia frequently suffer panic attacks in these situations.

A panic attack is essentially a short-circuiting of the body's natural "flight or fight" response. When faced with a physical threat, the body activates: heart rate rises, breathing becomes rapid, muscles become tense in preparation to fight or flee from some type of threat. When a panic attack occurs, this response is triggered by a psychological threat rather than a physical one.

Panic attacks develop by a kind of cycle. A cue, often perceived subconsciously, causes anxiety and the person begins to develop physical symptoms, such as elevated heart rate and rapid breathing. The person observes these symptoms and has negative thoughts in response to them, such as "oh, no, I'm having another panic attack" or "am I having a heart attack?" This leads to increasing anxiety, which in turn leads to increased physical symptoms and more negative thinking, leading to yet greater subjective anxiety in a kind of spiraling effect, eventually resulting in a panic attack.

Cognitive-behavioral psychotherapy can be an effective treatment for panic disorder. Breathing and relaxation techniques can help one to manage the physical symptoms of anxiety. Cognitive techniques can help one to alter negative thinking patterns that contribute to the development of the panic attack. Medications are also an option for treating panic disorder. Mental health professionals such as psychologists and psychiatrists can offer these treatments.
