A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JULIE

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. 2 Corinthians 5:16-20



Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen indeed! Alleluia! AMEN!

As we begin the month of April, we celebrate the resurrection of Christ, and the ushering in of new life. Once and for all, Jesus conquered death. We are justified, made right with God through the grace of Jesus Christ. For this we are thankful, though undeserving.

This also is a reminder that we are all human and fall short. We are being made new every day as we live into the calling and resurrected life Jesus ushered in for us. We know that all are children of God, all reconciled to him through his death and resurrection. And yet, we are so often reminded that we are human as well.

In this letter to the Corinthians, the writer reminds them that everyone is a new creation, and has become new! God has given us this through the ministry of reconciliation, a process that includes forgiveness. Reconciliation also takes some intentionality to refrain from those things that are human nature and harm relationships. This might include gossip, hurtful comments, and ideas of vindictiveness or revenge. As people of the resurrection, we are called to rise with Christ above the frailty of human actions and to forgive one another when we fail to do so. This can only come with intention and practice.

In Matthew 15, Jesus instructs that if we have a problem with someone, we go directly to them. I know we fail to do this; I fail to do this at times. I have also been the victim of these kinds of issues. Reconciliation is harder when I hear these rumors through others, because as a human it hurts and can be embarrassing.

Living lives as saints and sinners (check out the teaching of Martin Luther) is difficult. We know we are to live in Christ, and yet we will sin—that is why we need the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. I encourage the disciples of Ascension to live into this new creation that Christ has ushered in; and in doing so, we will boldly make Christ and Christ's vision known to our community.

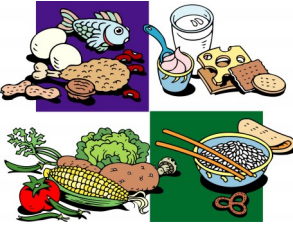
CELEBRATING HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE GRADUATES

“NO GO LIST” 2018

Did you see the article “No Go List” in the Saginaw News? *Guess what country is No. 8? Honduras!* Travel Guide Fodor's reason: “because of its high murder rate, particularly of the LGBT community.” As Honduras Team members, we know that the murder rate is high. Our annual mission trips continued in spite of that. The main reason for postponing our 2018 trip is the increased political turmoil in the country.



Many Ascension members know that our Synod (N/W Lower Michigan Synod) has had a companion relationship (through the Honduras Team) with the Lutheran Church of Honduras (ICLH) for 13 years now. Our congregation and others in the Synod have supported this Health for Life Ministry in many ways, including annual health mission trips to work with our Lutheran brothers and sisters in Honduras.

In 2017, 4 leaders from the ICLH visited several churches in Michigan: Saginaw, (including Ascension), Lansing and Grand Rapids. A team trip to Honduras was planned for March 2018 but was canceled due to the political unrest (demonstrations, protests, violence) resulting from the fraudulent presidential election in November. Our ELCA leaders overseeing the Latin American countries, Pastor Stephen Deal, Regional Representative for Latin America, and Paulina Dasse, ELCA Global Mission Manager for Relationships in Latin America, urged us to delay our trip for now. It is the team's hope that a visit can happen later in 2018. These are very difficult times for many Hondurans. Please pray for their safety and peace in their country.

The Honduras Team continues to support the ICLH by approving a budget for the ongoing ministries of the kindergarten nutrition program, water filters for families, children's dental program, women's health program and health education. We are grateful for the opportunity to serve our Lord and share His love with our Lutheran brothers and sisters in Honduras. It is encouraging for them to know we pray and care for them. We do make a difference!

The team consists of Mike Clifford, Dawn Dalton, John Whelton, Rick Herren, Jim Stuart and Ron Fries. We plan to meet on a regular basis with our first meeting in a couple weeks. This is a very serious issue, unfortunately. Communication is a two-way street. You will hear from us in the announcements, the Messenger, and a few meetings. We want to hear from you too...your thoughts and your concerns as we work our way through this, together. Thank you.

STEWARDSHIP

In April, we will hear more about how we are called to be stewards of all God has given us, and how we are called to give of our first fruits. Each family will be receiving a letter along with a pledge card that we ask you to return. There will be follow-up letters and visits for those who do not turn in their cards. In addition to your financial commitment, we are asking if there is interest in online giving, IRA rollovers, and estate planning.

Our financial goal as a congregation is to increase our giving by 3% and to pay off our mortgage in about ½ the time left. Thank you in advance for your help.

MORTGAGE FUND

Ascension has an outstanding mortgage from when the new Sanctuary was built. We currently owe approximately \$584,500 and at the current rate, the mortgage should be paid off in 15 years. Our goal is to pay this off in seven years. Our current monthly payment is over \$4000. We recognize that our ministry would benefit greatly if we had this money monthly to support our current and new ministries. If you have a one-time gift you would like to share, please consider directing this to the mortgage fund. ***We ask that you not decrease your general giving to give to the mortgage fund.***



THRIVENT MEMBERS

Are you a member of Thrivent Financial Services? Did you know you may have financial opportunities that cost nothing to you? You may be eligible for Thrivent Choice dollars. This is money that Thrivent gives to help 501c3 ministries (non-profits), including the congregation. To access this, you will need to sign into your account online, and you can direct your funds. This money again costs you nothing, and our representative tells us much of this money goes unclaimed. If you need help, please let the congregation know, and we can help you. You also are eligible to apply for a Thrivent Action team. This is another benefit as a member that provides \$250 seed money for projects. People have applied for things like our new freezer meal ministry, the chili cook-off, our youth program, soccer camp, back to school fair, our emergency bag program, etc. If you would be willing to help us with an action team, please let us know.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Members in Christ,

It has been some time since I updated you on the progress being made towards our strategic plan, so I thought I would brief you on a couple of things that are soon to be happening that center around our global goals. I will touch upon each of them briefly and as best as I can.



Our **Spiritual Health** Goal is “Nurture every relationship with Christ and equip each disciple in his/her Faith Journey”. One of our 3 - 5 year initiatives is to create a worship experience that evokes disciples to live and serve. Some of the short-term goals to achieve this experience have been to invite others to join as worship leaders: sound board, choir, altar guild, ushers; as well as train them in their duties. We have seen new faces in some of these roles and appreciate their willingness to share their God-given talents with us.

Our **Congregational Care** Goal of “Tending to every person of our community of faith with unconditional love and compassion in word and deed” is a daunting task. We have struggled a bit with just how to tackle this, and always welcome suggestions as well as individuals called to serve in this capacity. One such way to care for those struggling with serious medical issues is to provide resources, such as the book currently housed in the Library, “Cancer, So Now What”. This is for any member or someone you know that may be dealing with this terrible disease. Another initiative, that recently came about from a gathering of some of the Women of Ascension, is to create a space to store frozen meals to be taken to members who have returned from a hospital stay or have lost a loved one.

Our **Finance & Resource Management** Goal is to “Practice first fruits giving of time, talent, and treasures to ensure sustainability of our mission.” One of our 3 - 5 year initiatives is to increase giving by 3%, and our method to achieve this was to have an intentional stewardship program. You will be receiving a letter and stewardship pledge card in the mail. Please look for it and return it no matter your pledge amount. Another part of this intentional program is for lessons in the latter half of April to be focused on stewardship. A separate goal has been to increase our mission support, and we have been monitoring our financial status closely. At this time, we feel our finances are stable enough to support an increase in giving. Starting April 1st, we will send 3% of our weekly offering to mission support.

Outreach is our last, but not least goal to “Make a positive impact on the community by sharing the Kingdom of God”. We have done this the last several years by hosting the Back to School Fair. Last year we began the 48-hour emergency food bags, and hope to begin a weekend bag for school-aged children who may be going home with little to no food.

If you have any questions regarding any of the above programs, are inspired to serve in some capacity, or you see an unmet need, please feel free to reach out to a council member. We will gladly welcome your ideas, talents, and time.

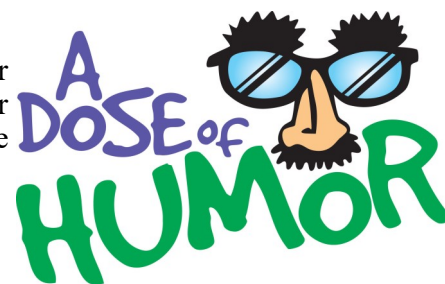
HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

Health Highlights by Sara Gregor, RN, Parish Nurse

LAUGHING: CAN IT KEEP YOU HEALTHY?

Generally, people with a good sense of humor have less stress and better health. Humor or mirthful laughter has positive effects on many of our body's systems. Laughter has real healing properties, too. Studies have shown that laughter:

- Reduces stress hormone levels.
- Increases antibodies that fight infections.
- Raises levels of immune-enhancing chemicals.
- Improves one's tolerance to pain.
- Increases one's pulse rate and metabolism—improving muscle activity and heart health. The deep breaths that come with laughter stretch and clear the lungs.



Humor connects us with others and helps us view the world with a broader perspective. If you are laughing, can you be angry at the same time? Not likely! In using humor or laughter, though, make sure you are laughing **WITH** the person. Laughing **AT** a person is rude and hurtful. (Look at their face. Are they uncomfortable, embarrassed or humiliated?) Be kind in sharing laughter.

Even with all the physical and emotional benefits we know laughter provides, sometimes we become “terminally serious” and forget to laugh.

- Remember to laugh at yourself. Allow yourself to be imperfect occasionally and laugh at your humanness.
- Be thankful for your problems. Life is a challenge. If it weren't for problems, most of us would be unemployed!
- Develop your sense of play and creativity.
- Take time to laugh. Share humorous insights, events of the day, or whatever makes you laugh. More is better.
- Keep smiling; it takes more energy to frown.
- Hang around kids; they still know how to laugh.
- The Lord wants us to have joy in our lives!

“Let me hear joy and gladness...restore to me the joy of Your salvation.” Psalm 51:8, 12 NIV

“Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Serve the Lord with gladness...” Psalm 100:1-2 NIV

Make humor part of your lifestyle. The prescription for longevity: good doses of laughter, often along with giggles, chuckles and guffaws. Experience the joy that our Lord wants for us!

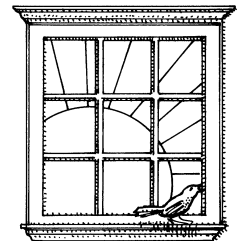
