A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JULIE BAPTISM

"As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." ~Galatians 3:27-28



The season of Lent is a time to renew our baptism. In the Small Catechism, Luther teaches that baptism brings about forgiveness of sins, redeems from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe it, as the words and promise of God declare. In baptism, we receive new birth, each and every day.

Therefore, Luther encourages us to remember our baptism daily. Since water is the earthly element, I often will make a sign of the cross on my forehead when I am showering, doing dishes, or washing my hands. It is that frequent reminder that I belong to God.

In baptism, we also make a covenant with God where we promise to:

- live among God's faithful people;
- hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper;
- proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed;
- serve all people following the example of Jesus; and
- strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Baptism is an entrance rite of the church. Some congregations place their baptismal font at the entrance of the church so people pass it on the way into worship, as well as signifying the sacrament as an entrance into the worshipping community. In March, a baptismal font will be placed in the entry way. You are invited to dip your fingers into the font and make the sign of the cross if you desire—renewing the commitment you have made and reminding you of the promises God made with you.

As we enter into this season, consider ways in which you might live out your baptismal covenant—this might include adding in daily scripture reading or prayer, invite someone to worship or an event, encourage a friend who is ill or in need, visit someone who is sick or homebound, serve in the community, intentionally save extra money to donate to disaster relief or a community agency, or pray for someone you need to forgive.

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers...day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people." ~Acts 2:42, 46-47

WEEKEND BACKPACK FOOD PROGRAM

Ascension's Outreach Ministry is asking for your help with our Weekend Backpack Food Program. We are currently filling and delivering backpacks of food each week to 58 elementary school children in the Hemlock, St. Charles and Swan Valley school districts. These are children identified by the schools as not having adequate access to food when home on the weekends.

We thank you in advance for your help. Let's really make some NOISE on March 17th and March 20th!!!




MARTHA TO MARY WOMENS' BIBLE STUDY



MARIJUANA IS LEGAL...NOW WHAT?

Marijuana was made legal for medical use in the State of Michigan in 2008. It was made legal for recreational use in the fall of 2018.

Under the original law, marijuana was made legal to treat a number of conditions, including chronic pain, Parkinson's disease, Tourette's syndrome, cancer, glaucoma, posttraumatic stress disorder, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), and others. It was *not* made legal to treat anxiety, depression, asthma, non-chronic pain, schizophrenia, or social anxiety disorder. Research on the effects of marijuana treatment for chronic pain patients has found "modest evidence" of its effectiveness.



Supporters of the law legalizing marijuana for recreational use have suggested that it is no worse than alcohol. Supporting that, an average of 88,000 deaths occur due to alcohol each year (mostly driving-related), while zero deaths can be attributed directly to marijuana use. If you drink alcohol and drive, you are 2,200% more likely to be involved in a car accident. If you smoke marijuana and drive, that figure is "only" 83% more likely. Ergo, it's not a good idea to do either. Incidentally, a University of Michigan study showed that over 50% of medical marijuana users had driven within two hours after smoking it, with over 20% describing themselves as being "very high" at the time. The introduction of legal marijuana for recreational use is unlikely to decrease the number of high drivers.

Heavy drinking may cause blackouts or immediate difficulty forming memories. Heavy use of marijuana, particularly among younger individuals, has been associated with long-term problems with learning and memory. Neither substance is considered safe for use during pregnancy. As reported by drugabuse.com, a longitudinal study found that heavy users of marijuana lost an average of 8 points off their measured IQ between the ages of 13 and 38; that's a significant loss in intellectual ability. Note that IQ's of healthy individuals are stable over time.

Is marijuana addictive? According to the Centers for Disease Control, yes, it can be. One in ten users of marijuana becomes addicted. For individuals under the age of eighteen, that figure is one in six. By contrast, the National Institute of Health reported in 2015 that 6.2% of Americans over the age of 18 suffer from alcohol use disorder. 86% of adults report some use of alcohol. That means that about one in fourteen people who drink alcohol abuse it. In other words, marijuana is more addictive than alcohol.

Harvard Health (as reported by drugs.com) indicates that the risk of heart attack is significantly elevated in marijuana users in the hour after smoking. Also as reported by drugs.com, the amount of carcinogenic chemicals in marijuana is 50-70% higher than in tobacco.

The following are also associated with frequent use of marijuana: lower life satisfaction, poorer physical health, poorer mental health, increased relationship problems, and lessened academic and career success.

In summary, just because marijuana has been legalized for recreational purposes does not mean it is a benign substance. It is a drug with many harmful effects; it can cause both physical and cognitive problems if used heavily over a long period of time, as well as to negatively impact one's life in a variety of areas. Hopefully, Michigan citizens will proceed with caution in responding to this change in the law.

IN MEMORY

IN MEMORY OF OUR FOUNDING PASTOR, JACOB "JAKE" E. KNOEDLER: MARCH 18, 1933—DECEMBER 18, 2018

The founding pastor of Ascension Lutheran Church passed away in December. His name was Pastor Jacob Knoedler. He came to Shields in 1959 to start a mission church.

He and I graduated from Capital University in 1956. Capital is our church's college in Columbus, Ohio. It is next door to our ELCA Theological Seminary. Like many of the men in our class, Jake moved next door to study and become a pastor in the Lutheran Church. After the four years required to become a pastor, he was a Youth Pastor at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Roseville (Detroit). After one and a half years he was assigned his first church....Ascension. St John's Lutheran Church in Saginaw had purchased seven acres of land for developing a "Mission Church" west of town, on the corner of Gratiot and Van Wormer Roads.



Pastor Jake, as he became known to us, organized our congregation and built the first sanctuary, a pagoda-like design that he felt would be unique enough to be remembered. He and his family lived in a "parsonage", the house on the very south corner of the property. The house was built by a member of our church, George Wilson, Tim Wilson's father.

Beverly and I moved to Saginaw with three very small children four years later, in the summer of 1964, to find Ascension, with my good ping pong and golf buddy from Capital University, now the pastor. We became good friends with Jake and Martha. They showed us how to "camp" and our kids grew up together. We immediately became solid members of Ascension, and Jake asked us to lead the Luther League. Classes met Sunday mornings in our home on Herbert Drive, one block from the church, with about a dozen teenagers, including Rusty Van Marter and Barbara Schomaker, who we now know as Rusty and Barb Van Marter.

We remember Pastor Jake for his kind and strong leadership. He led Ascension for four and a half years and got us started in growing what is now our home, Ascension Lutheran Church. He went on to establish a church in Jackson, Michigan; and after that he moved to Florida, where he became a spiritual leader in the communities of Orlando and Melbourne.

Jake, may you Rest in Peace. We thank you for showing us how to build and grow a church. We pray God's blessings for you; for many, you were our first look at a Pastor and Disciple of His church.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Members in Christ,

Thank you to all of you who took time out of your busy schedules to attend the annual meeting that was held on February 17th. Most of us are not fans of meetings in general, but the annual meeting is important for several reasons. First, as you may know, this meeting is required per our constitution to be held in February. Secondly, the annual meeting is designed to recap the past year's activities, but more importantly put them on record officially. Finally, the annual meeting is one of the avenues the congregation has to make our voices heard. So thank you to the 31 members who attended to allow official church business to occur.



One question posed at the annual meeting was regarding average worship attendance from 2018 vs. previous years. Although council sees a monthly report for each individual month's giving and attendance compared to the previous year, we do not keep or report a yearly running total. This kind of accounting is tracked at the Synod level; we submit a report to them yearly. The report contains a variety of statistical information, including giving and attendance. In this report you will find interesting tidbits such as, we received more members than we removed in each of the years 2013 to 2017. Average worship attendance of baptized membership is roughly on average around 22% (math majors, this is not an exact average), with a high of 23.9% to a low of 21.8% (data source 2010-2017). Average weekly worship attendance in 2017 was 170 and in 2018 it was 159. Are you one of God's sheep? Are you a cast sheep? Maybe your wool is matted down? Are you stuck in a valley, or meandering your way to higher ground? Do you know your shepherd? Does he use a staff or rod to guide you? If you understand these questions, then you are enjoying "A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23" and better yet, attending a discussion group.
