### A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JULIE

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Waiting through Lent to say that seemed like an eternity! But Sunday came, Christ is risen, Christ is risen indeed!



So what does that mean in your living, past the countless hard-boiled egg recipes, leftover ham sandwiches, and the tulips and lilies replanted? During this season, Jesus has taught us what it means to be a servant, to be claimed by God, that we belong to something bigger than we can imagine, and our God loves us more than we can love ourselves. Through Christ's death and resurrection we have the opportunity to live a new life, full of grace and promise.

Through Christ, we are offered new life, and yet many of us live as if nothing is changed. The reality is, Jesus' resurrection changes everything. It is resurrected life—new, better, changed. Jesus was not resuscitated—brought back to the way it was. Resurrection is not a new lease on life, it IS new life. This changes everything. We live and we act differently. Priorities are different. We are Christ-centered, not self-centered.

The other evening I was talking to someone from another denomination in our community. He shared with me that his congregation was soon to pair up with another two to three other congregations from the area—all sharing a pastor. We have seen this in our Lutheran circles as congregations close and work as anchor congregations. In our community, the number of people who claim to believe in God or are active in a faith community is decreasing.

Church, this is the time to step it up and proclaim the new life offered in Jesus Christ. It's not about bringing in new members to the congregation; this is about boldly making Christ known in everything we do and say. What are we communicating to the community? What are you saying to family and friends? How is your life a witness to the resurrected Jesus, to the new life offered to all people?

A woman of great faith from my first congregation died recently. As I reflect on her life on earth, she wasn't a perfect person: she could get under my skin, and I know I got under hers. But she had a saying, "if your salvation is not dependent on this, it doesn't matter". She was reminding us as we complained about a variety of things, as we worried about "small things," that salvation is living with Jesus as if nothing else matters. Faith is in every atom of our being; everything in life is affected by faith. Our ultimate living in life is about God, our faith, the grace and promise of eternal life, now and always.

So embrace the new life in Jesus! Live, focus, and thrive—Christ is Risen! Alleluia!

### PROCESS FOR NEW MINISTRIES — "TEAM OF THREE"

As we continue to live into a new structure of church (new as in three years now), we have developed a process in which people can start new ministries or how host an event. Below is an outline of how this process will work.

Purpose: To provide a framework for members to work on ministries that they have interest in and are consistent with the mission and ministry of Ascension Lutheran Church.

- 1. A person or small group determines a desire or need for our ministry. Together they consider:
  - -Desired intent and outcome
  - -Audience/participants
  - -Cost (considering financial and personnel)
  - -Calendar availability
  - -Is this a one-time or continuous ministry—what will it take to maintain
- 2. As a Team of Three (or more), the sounding board/support team is the ministry in which it primarily falls and/or an executive team member.
- 3. Approval for any costs in a financial year must be approved by the Church Council prior to any spending. If possible, ministry would be proposed for consideration of budgeted money.
- 4. Upon implementation, the Team of Three is responsible for maintaining assigned budget, advertising, meeting deadlines and communication.

### INTRODUCING BREEZE CHURCH MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Last year, the Church Council and staff began to look at new software due to the change in contract with our previous provider. After checking references and asking questions, we decided to use the Breeze Church Management software. This is our database for membership. In addition to keeping track of addresses and demographics, this system allows us to customize fields as needed and desired.

As of now, we have re-entered all the data we had in the previous system, and made some updates as we have had time. We have also identified some typos in phone numbers and even names—thanks for your understanding.

One of the benefits of this system is that each member has the capability of accessing their own accounts. You can update the main data, you can view your giving, and you can see the online directory—even pictures if they have been added. You can NOT see the giving of other people or change your own giving record. You can complete your Time and Talent Sheet in Breeze.

If we have had the chance to enter your email, you likely received an invite to sign up. Once signed up, you can review and revise your information and begin using the online directory. We may even be able to produce our own pictorial directory in the future. Check it out. If you have not received an invite, please email Cheryl or Pastor Julie your email so we can get you set up.





# **CONGREGATIONAL CARE**

### A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER OF CONGREGIONAL CARE

I am a fan of Dr. James Dobson and his weekday Family Talk broadcasts on AM radio. Dr. Dobson's mission for over forty years has been to promote the wholeness of the family unit, challenge reforms that intrude on the family unit, and provide evidence of what works and doesn't work, often through the witness of those who have often learned the hard way.



For the past several months I have been listening to various programs and frequently wondering how many of my fellow members at Ascension could benefit from the information provided, as well as, how many are not even aware of the program. Had I a short commute to work, I probably would never have stumbled across his program myself.

Nevertheless, the program is well done and speaks about current issues. Occasionally, there is an intentional broadcast of a recorded session made more than a decade ago (in one instance 40 years), sometimes to show that past warnings have come true and other times to show that the world hasn't changed that much.

If you would like to see what the program is like, here are a few of my favorites that have aired within the last few weeks. These podcasts, each of which is approximately twenty-minutes in duration, can be retrieved at <a href="https://www.drjamesdobson.org/broadcasts/past-broadcasts">https://www.drjamesdobson.org/broadcasts/past-broadcasts</a>. Clicking on the "Additional Broadcasts" link will prompt you to the particular year and month of the broadcast. Some topics are covered in back-to-back sessions, yet two sessions can be listened to in well under an hour.

### Not a Day Care - The Future of Truth on College Campuses - Dr. Everett Piper, February 1, 2019

Dr. Piper, President of Oklahoma Wesleyan University, was not a well-known individual a couple years ago, until the day he responded to a student's claim that he was offended by a professor's statement made in his lecture: the professor's subject—I Corinthians 13 (subject matter – love). In response, Dr. Piper wrote of the incident in the local paper, and it went viral when someone placed it on Facebook. Listen to what he says about today's educational system, our culture, and what we are lacking.

### God is Not Dead, Gert Behanna, February 21/22, 2019

Remember in the 1960s and 1970s when there was talk that God was dead? This is a recording of Gert Behanna's personal story of how she grew up in a wealthy family, failed miserably in life (two failed marriages, alcoholism and more), and nearly succeeded in her attempt at suicide. Find out about her turnaround—the rest of her life, which began at age 53.

### Healing the Past and Moving On, Guest, Dr. Carolyn Koons, February 28, 2019/March 1, 2019

It is hard to relate to the difficulty some of our youth experience. In this case, two back-to-back statements that prompted me to reflect what some children have to address at an early age: "At the age of nine, I knew that I was different" (from everyone else in the family) and based on a sad relationship with her parents, she concluded at that age, "I am going to have to make it on my own."

### The Impact of Truth in My Life, Guests, Josh and Sean McDowell, March 6/7, 2019

You have probably heard and know of Josh McDowell but this story reveals more about an unfortunate time in his life and how it continues to impact him today. Two key thoughts: First, regardless of circumstances, don't ever think of yourself as a victim. Second, regardless of your past, don't ever think of yourself as damaged goods.

for women,10 ounces for men)

Soy: healthy (associated with lower risks of cancers and heart disease)


