

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JULIE

The Jarringness of Lent



And yet, I think part of the purpose of Lent is to jar us out of our complacency, to do things just a little different. We begin the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday (February 26th) with the imposition of ashes on our forehead. We hear the words "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." These words always shake me up a bit, remembering that I am not immortal.

Throughout the season of Lent, we are invited to enter into certain ritual practices.

No Alleluias—we don't use the word "Alleluia" in our song or speech in worship. We are sort of "stripped down" to the basics, focusing on simplicity.

We are invited into a time of fasting. For some of us, this might be literally fasting, not eating certain foods or not eating on certain days. For others it may be to abstain from idols like television, video games, phone, etc. It is not meant for punishment or penance, but a means in which we can refocus ourselves in our relationship with God. It's a way of saying, "I want you, God, more than this"!

We are invited into intentional prayer. Lent is a great time to intentionally add some discipleship practices. Prayer is a great one to start. You may want to experience different ways of praying—with a candle, journaling or art. You may want to choose something or someone you find it hard to pray for—for we are instructed to pray for friends and enemies. Sometimes I watch the news and as segments of news are shown, I pray for whatever and whoever the segment is about.

We are invited into community and worship. For some of us, this means to make worship a priority in life, especially if your idol is sleeping in. Come to worship with the intention of giving all you have to God, giving praise—not so much with what you will get out of it. This is a time of focusing on God and not on ourselves.

During the season of Lent, our Wednesday night services will be separate from our Sunday services, so why not try both? I know...a little jarring!

The Endowment Fund Committee is accepting applications for 2020 to fund projects which may support any of the following activities:



FUNERAL PLANNING

One of the most difficult conversations to have with family seems to center around funeral preparation. We don't want to think about that; it isn't a happy conversation. From experience, this is one of the most loving things you can do for your family when the time comes that this information is needed.



To help with planning, Ascension has developed a small booklet entitled Funeral Planning which includes various things to consider. It addresses some of the preferences you may have for the service and also information that will be helpful when arrangements are being made with the funeral home.

These booklets are available at church, and I would be happy to sit down with anyone who might like someone to go through the information with them. Be sure to place this information in the same place other important documents are, so that your loved ones will have this available when they are called upon to make these plans.



STEWARDSHIP TO THINK ABOUT—JUVENILE LIFE INSURANCE

When my brother and I were born, my grandparents took out a small life insurance policy for us. It always seemed strange to me, because no one wants to think about or prepare for the possibility this life insurance will be needed for a child. However, what I have come to find out is how beneficial this gift really was. For me, I cashed it in when I started working and was setting up my own

household. My brother, however, was able to keep his, and was able to increase the coverage periodically. This was important because my brother was diagnosed with a chronic illness at age 10 and getting life insurance would have been difficult, if not impossible. In conversation with other parents who have done this, it has proved to be a benefit.

Since taking the Financial Peace University course, and being intentional about financial health and stewardship, I have come to appreciate and learn about ways we can be faithful stewards. I believe one of these ways is through life insurance that begins when our children are children. Why start a juvenile life insurance plan?

- oPremiums can be low! One policy I saw was \$12/month, and that premium could be locked in for life.
- °The child maintains insurability throughout life, even if they experience health issues later in life.
- oIf the unthinkable happens, the life insurance could help supplement medical bills/time off work.
- °The policy holds cash values as long as premiums are paid.

This is something to consider as your family grows—a great gift to the child from a parent or grandparent.



OPIOID ADDICTION IN TEENS

Opioids are increasingly abused throughout the United States, a situation known as the Opioid Epidemic. Drug overdose is now the leading cause of accidental death among Americans. Opioid use disorder (OUD) is a growing crisis among the young. Teenagers who have suffered major injuries, such as car accidents, are often prescribed opioids to help with the pain. As the user takes more and more of the drug, they may eventually develop a tolerance, and possibly a full-blown addiction. Once

addicted, users often make increasingly risky choices. Statistics from 2017 indicate that every day 900 teens began misusing opioids. This leads to heroin and other illegal opioid use as well. In 2016, 276,000 adolescents between the ages of 12 and 17 used pain relievers (including opioids) for non-medical reasons, and often become addicted to prescription drugs. Teenage opioid addiction rates increased by 19 percent between 2014 and 2015. When asked, 12th-grade students identified the ease of availability of heroin as a factor in their use. Heroin is a cheaper substitute for prescription opioids like Oxycodone, Percocet, Oxycontin, and Hydrocodone.

Determining whether or not a teenager is experiencing a substance use disorder like opioid addiction can be a challenge. Some signs can be obvious, while others are subtle. Signs of teenage opioid addiction can include, but are not limited to:

- •Changes in sleep patterns
- •Agitation
- Mood swings
- Poor academic performance
- Missing classes
- •Getting in trouble in school or with the law
- Withdrawing from family or friends

Teenage opioid addiction can follow them into adulthood; and the longer an addiction progresses, the more difficult it is to treat. That's why early treatment is so important. Rehab facilities provide medically-supervised detox to create a more comfortable and safer way to get through withdrawal. Teens can speak with therapists to uncover deep challenges which fuel their dependence. Support groups encourage teens to practice vulnerability and connection with others.
